We have had some very good bus drivers during the past decade, but the writer believes that we have had few, if any, that have been better than Buster Aldred and Gerald Moore.

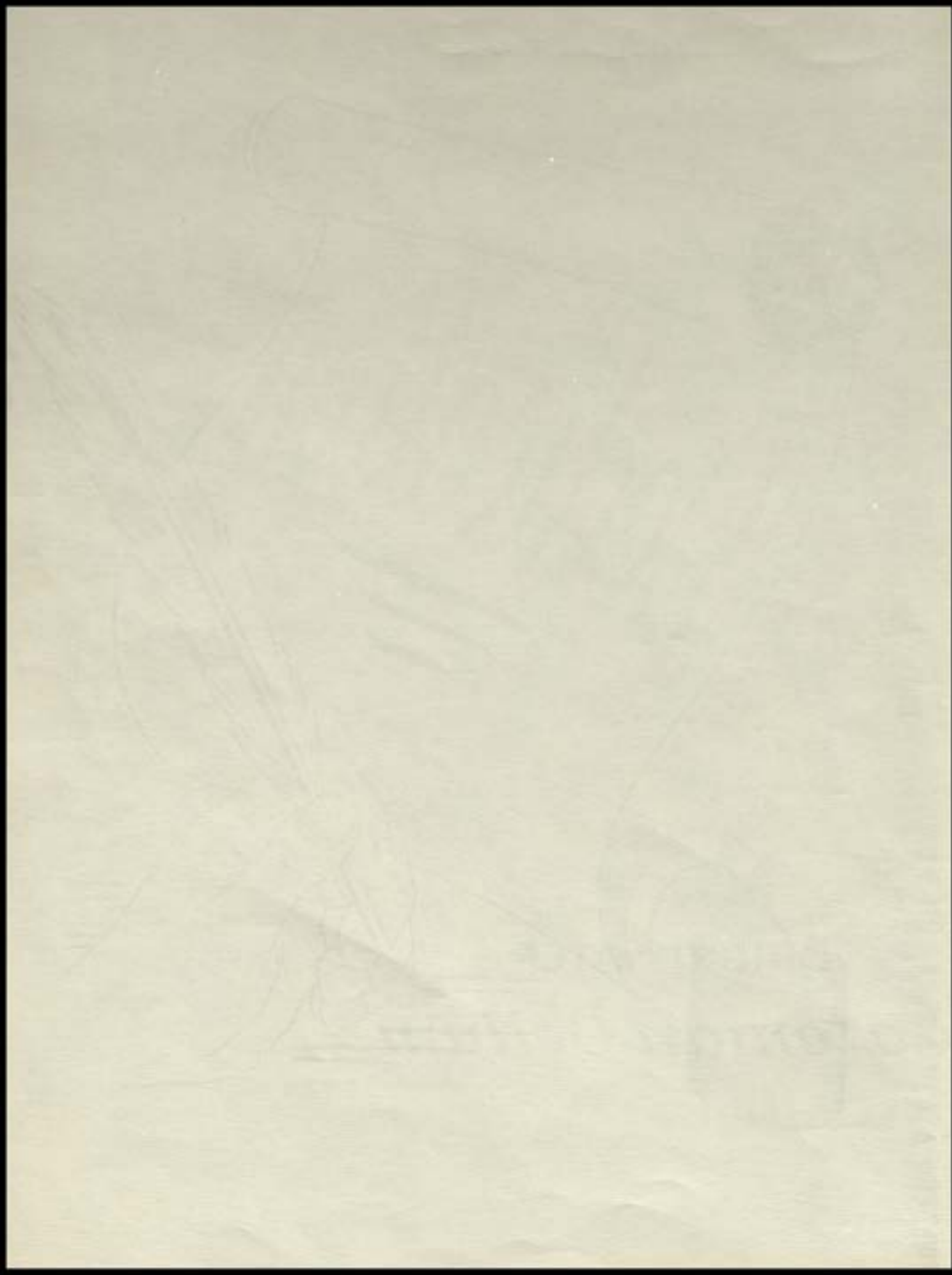

Oliver Lockett is the head of the Barber's Union in Pueblo, and is a big John L. Lewis fan.

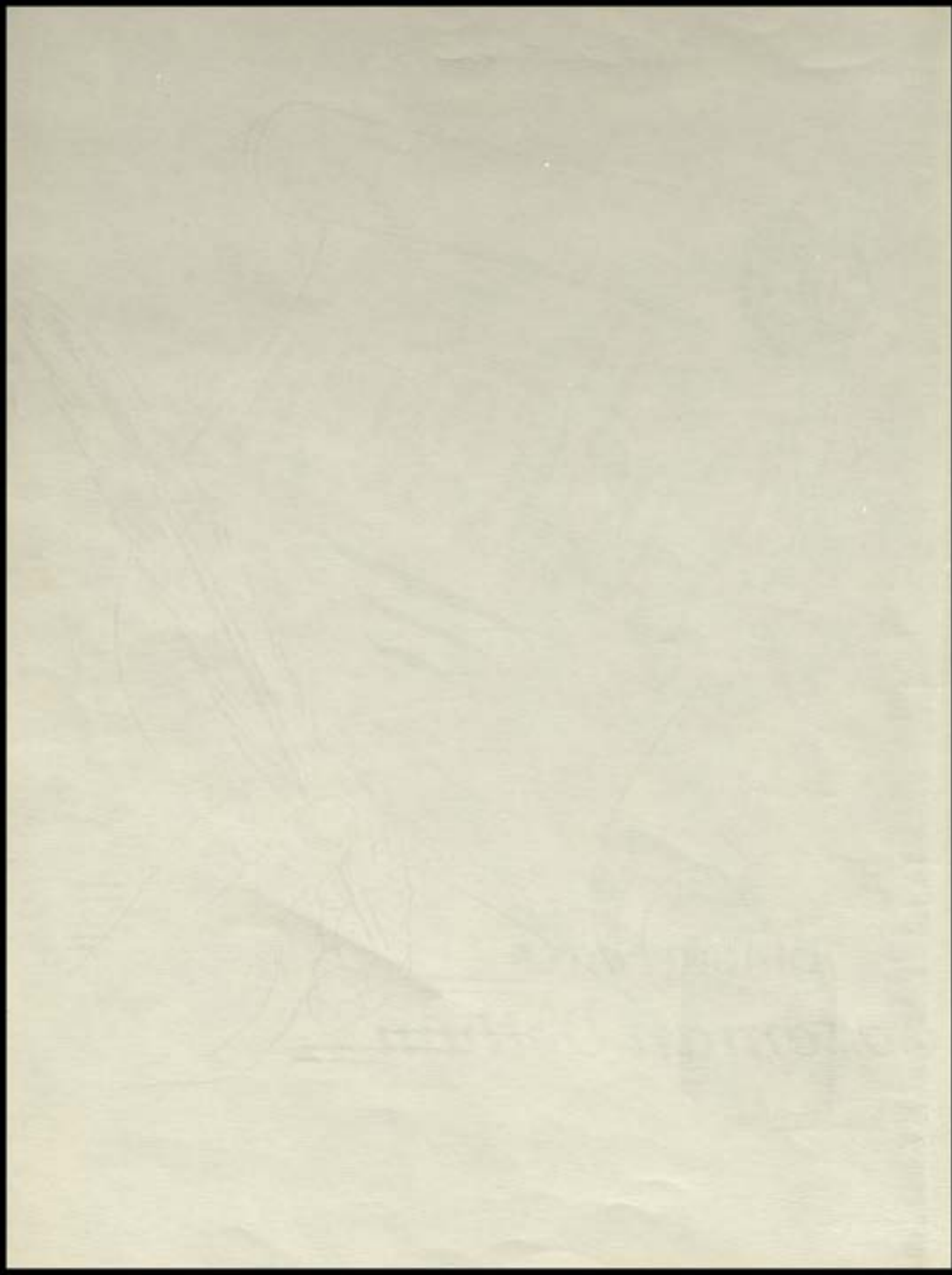
Ellsworth Boughan is the head baker at the Rainbow Bread Factory in Pueblo.


LeRoy Knisley is the proud owner of a new automobile. With the advanced design you can't tell whether he is going up, down, backwards, forwards, or sideways.

Were dull and dreary.

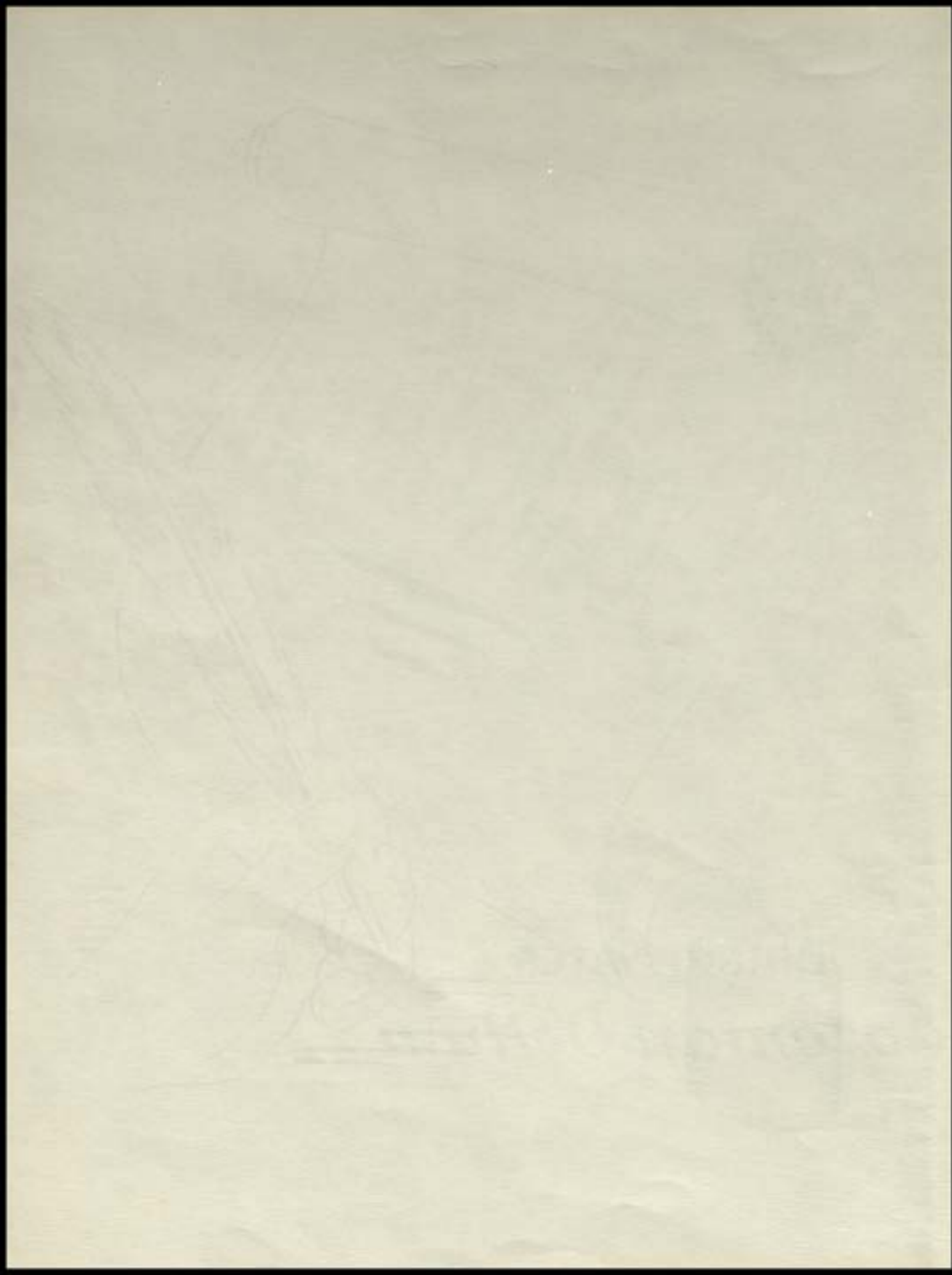
Our lessons we thought were hard to get

Without a sweat.


Our love to the boys who played on the team

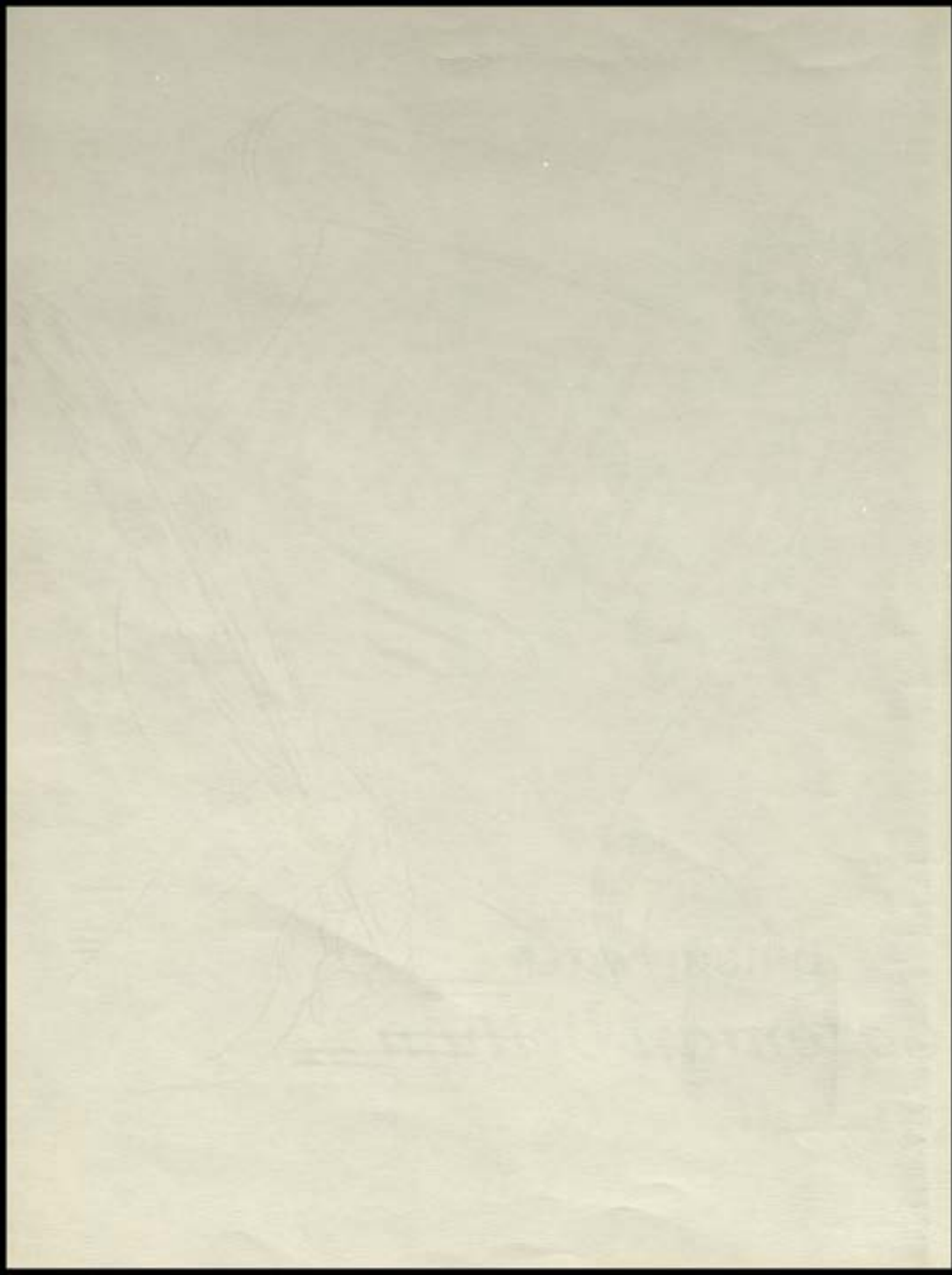

COMMENCEMENT

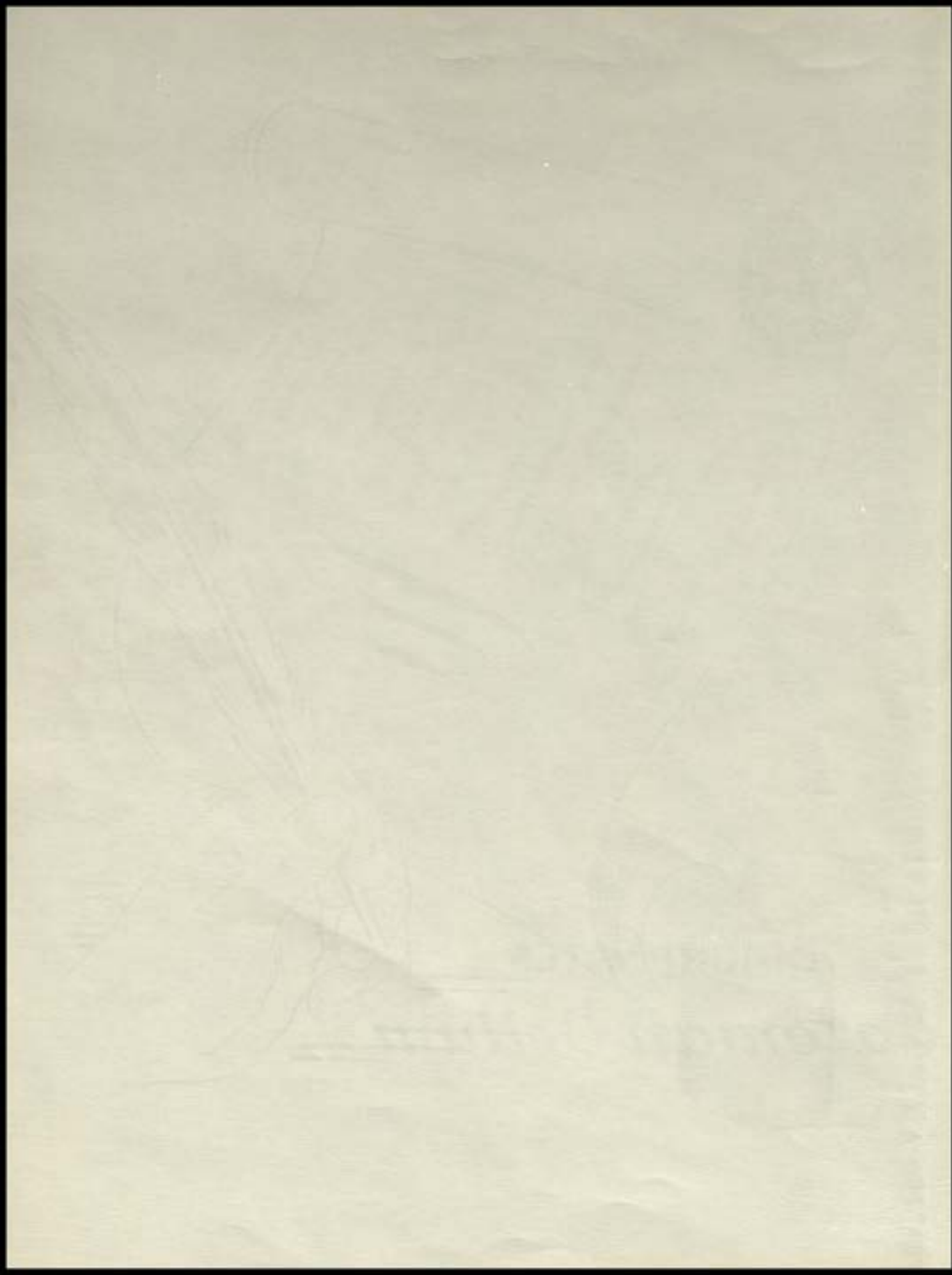

CLASS HISTORY

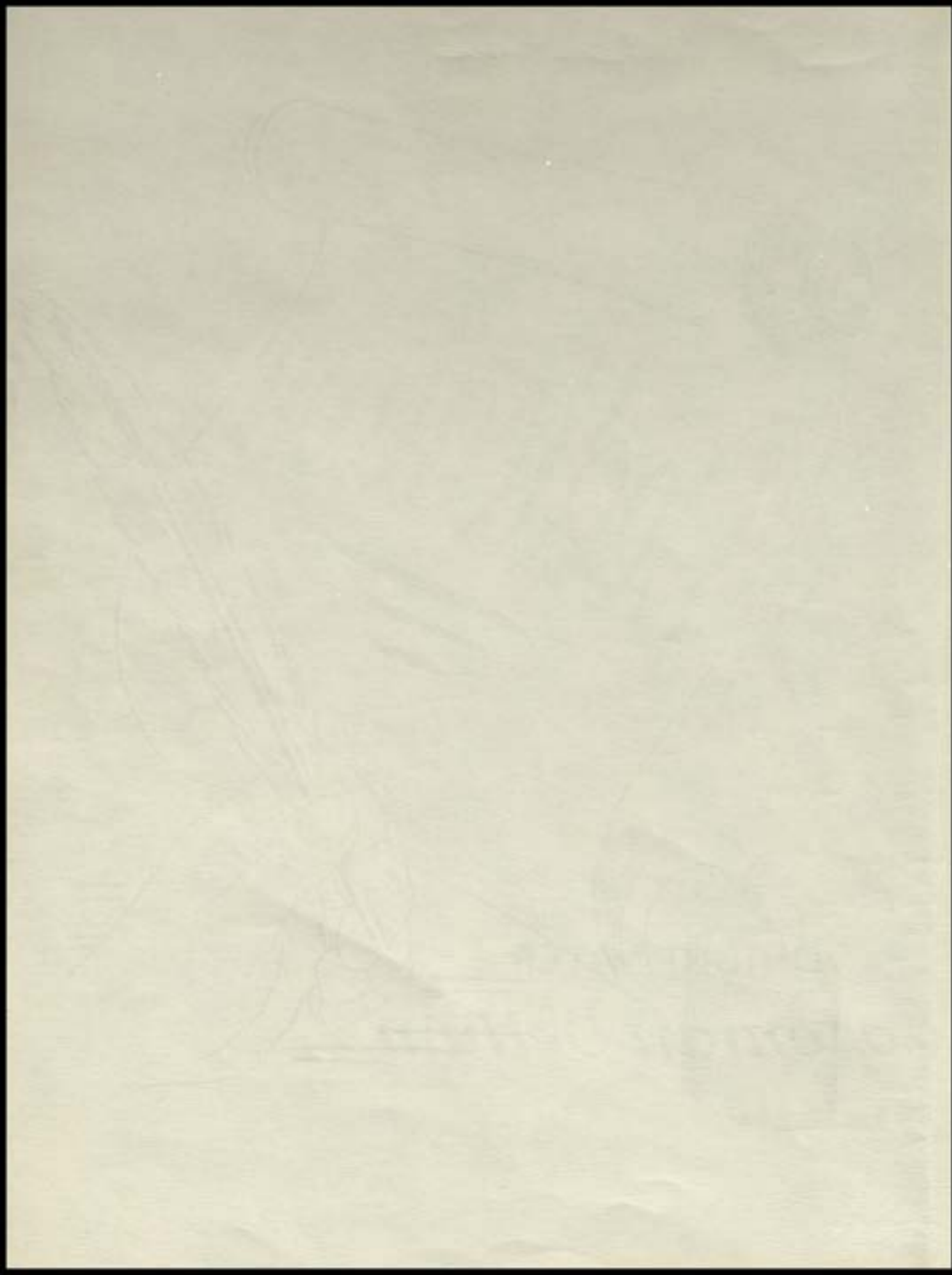

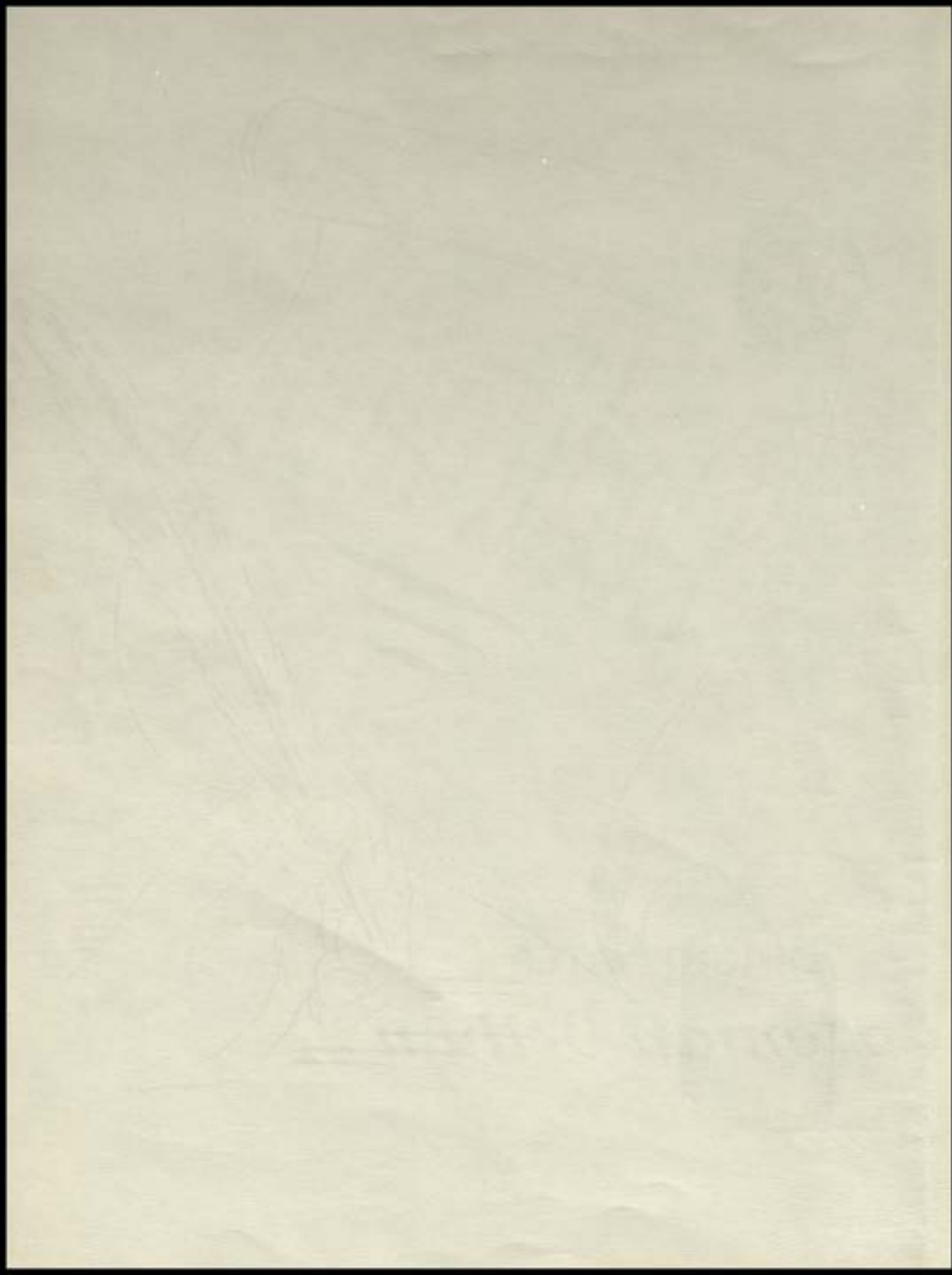
Still green but willing, we entered upon the second year of our high school journey. On our Bum Day, we went over the Skyline Drive and through the Tunnel Drive.

SOPHOMORE BUM DAY

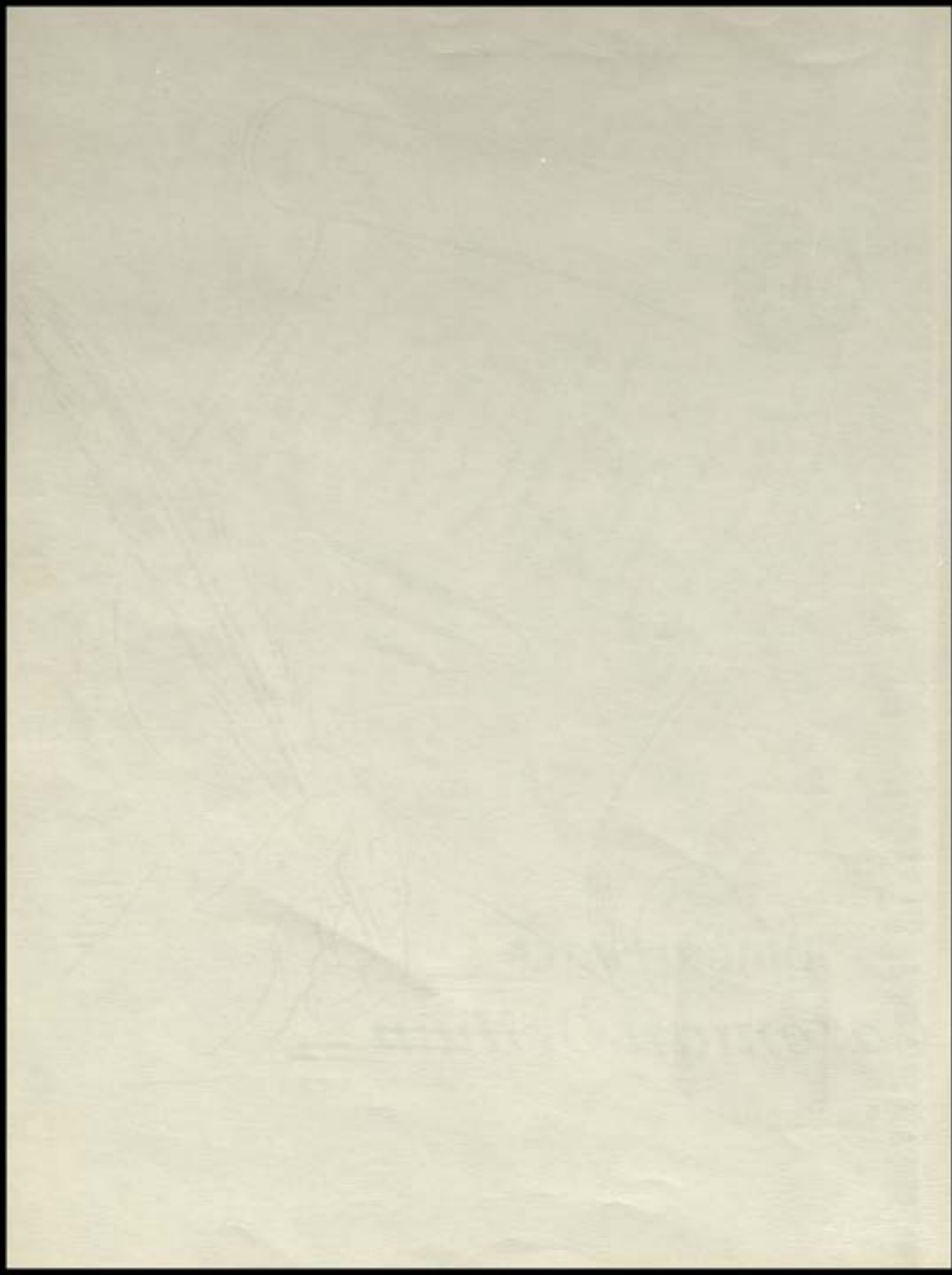

GOVERNMENT OF THE SCHOOL

The government of the school is about the same as that of any other small rural school. Matters of discipline are taken care of as they arise by the principal and teachers. The matter of rules and regulations is handled in similar fashion, each case being settled on its own merits as it arises. The Board of Education is also a vital factor in the regulations of the school.

A small achievement card is given at the end of the year to pupils that have done extra good work in the required courses and in extra activities. Letters are sometimes given as special recognition in the various phases of our activities. The state and other institutions grant scholarships which are awarded to worthy pupils.

EXTRA CIRCULAR ACTIVITIES

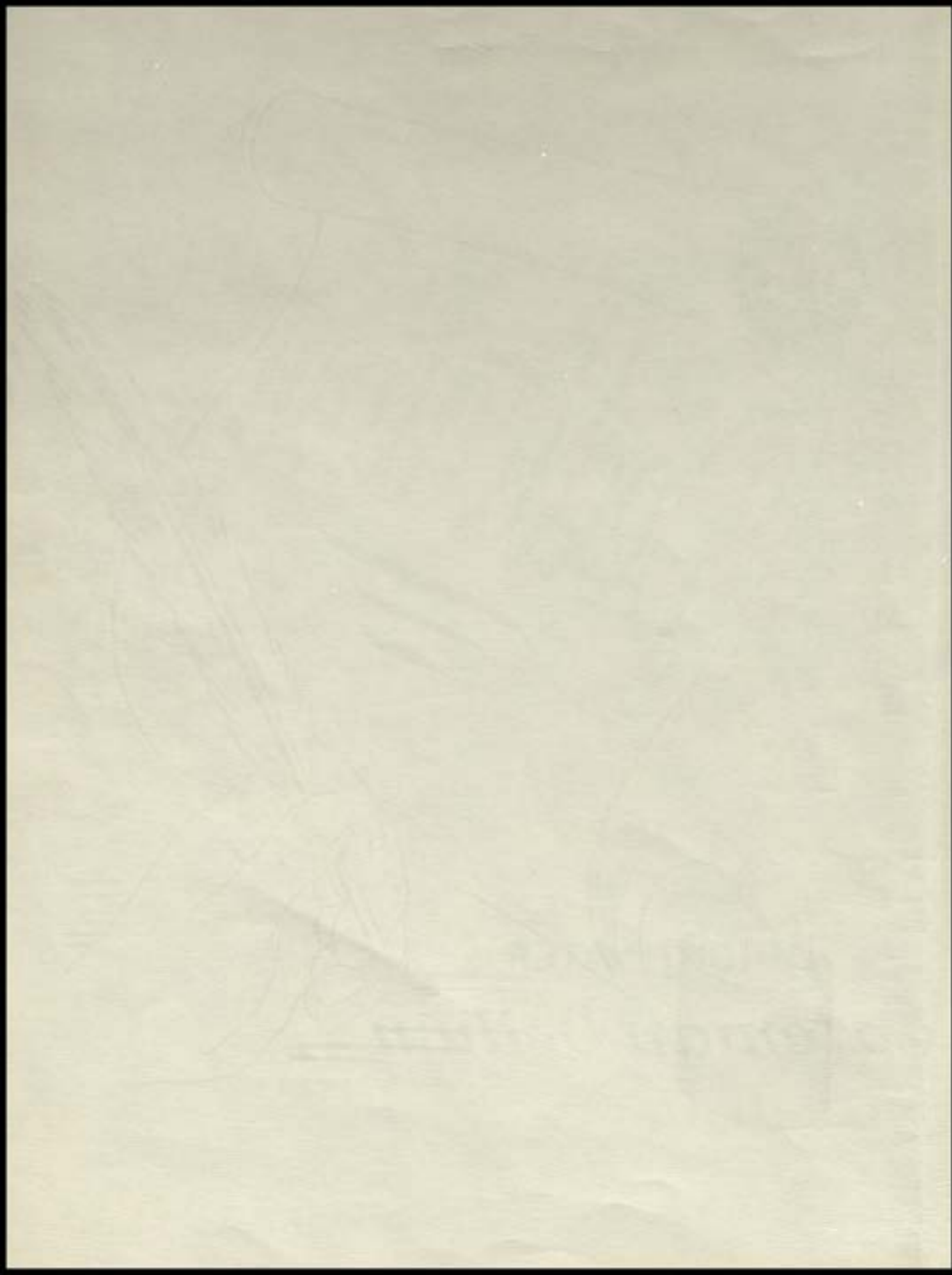
The extra curricular activities of Penrose Consolidated school are limited to athletics for boys and girls. The athletics being made up largely of basketball and softball for men and the regular schedule of GAA activities for women. The basketball has for the past twelve years been carried on in the old Cherry-canning factory building. The Penrose High School has for the past fifteen or more years been a member of the Pikes Peak League and in 1937 we were league winners. They have several times been second winners. Such was the case in 1945. The GAA carried on by the Penrose High School girls was started in the spring of 1946. GAA stands for Girl's Athletic Association. It includes such activities as archery, track, basketball, hiking, softball, camping, and other athletic events. Any girl in High School is eligible to join this association. The awards are given by a point system. The association also carries on Pep activities.

HISTORY OF PENROSE SCHOOL

Miss Byers taught the first school in her house for a few months. Her home was right west of where the Church of Christ now is. The second school was about 50 yards east of where Mrs. Schroeder lives now. It was there 3 years. The third school was in Ben Taylor's store. It was there 3 years. The fourth school was on top of test hill. It was there 5 years. About 1916 the present high school was built. The grade school was in the science room and shop in the basement. In 1921 the grade school department was built onto the high school. In the early 30's the W. P. A. dug out from under the grade school and made the lunch room. Right soon after the hot lunch project was started.

MUSIC

Instruction has been given on various instruments and a High School orchestra organized. It has been useful not only in furnishing individual enjoyment to pupils but for organization programs such as P. T. A., County Teachers Meeting and various school functions including graduation. The vocal schedule includes solos, duets, quartettes and a mixed chorus, which has been useful in adding to various entertainments. Some of the pupils participated in the school music contest at Gunnison and were fortunate enough to win some places of honor.
